

Gratefulness and Hope

2022 has been a year of many changes at JESC. Some good people left the team, and other good people arrived, bringing their new talents, expertise and joy. This change included the Director position due to an end of mandate for Peter Rožič SJ. Peter was responsible for the current shape of this Centre (with the circles of Ecology, Leadership, European Affairs and Justice), and we wish him the best in his new dedication to Ecology. There was also a change in JESC's location, as we left the Foyer Catholique European,



firstly to Schaerbeek for a few months and then settling in La Viale Europe, only a few steps away from the European Parliament.

In regards to projects and activities, 2022 was the year when the long-dreamed Justice and Ecology Congress finally took place. About 160 people, coming from the five different social and ecology networks of Europe and beyond, gathered for a week in Loyola and forged a new impulse to the continental social sector. The European Leadership Programme (ELP) went through a detailed evaluation involving many people, and the so-called ELP 2.0 kicked off. In Ecology, the Carbon Footprint Project (rebaptised JESC Carbon Initiative) moved from the pilot phase to a well-established work plan. Also a stronger focus and more solid means for advocacy were set in place. Finally, the European Affairs circle was responsible for some meaningful events during the year, in partnership with other groups interested in the European project.

Looking back to the year gone by, gratitude is the feeling conferred towards so many people, members of the team and several funders and partners, whose commitment and collaboration enabled all the work you'll read about in the next pages. Lack of gratitude is always a lack of memory, therefore this recognition is very much deserved. It is with the same joy and hope that we look at 2023 as these solid foundations promise a fruitful new year.

JESC's origins can be traced back to 1956 with the foundation in Strasbourg of the "Catholic Office for Information on European Issues" (OCIPE) which served the purpose of being a research, reflection and documentation centre on European issues. Later, OCIPE opened offices in Brussels (1963), Budapest and Warsaw (both in 1990), and it published several revues ("La Lettre de l'OCIPE," "Objectif Europe," "Europe Infos" together with COMECE) from 1959 until 2018. In 2012 each centre became autonomous, and JESC assumed the Brussels-based OCIPE mission.

In 2020, under inspiration of Pope Francis's (Re)Thinking Europe - a Christian Contribution to the Future of the European Project 2017 address and the new approved Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAPs) of the Society of Jesus, JESC redefined its identity. Its slogan and purpose is now presented as "Vision and Values for Europe," the mission corresponds to "Promot[ing] Faith and Justice by Rediscovering the European Common Good", and the vision is stated as "Implement[ing] the processes of the UAPs," with the 4 strategic goals/areas of work - Europe, Justice, Ecology and Leadership - deriving from the above.

With its Europe-focused mission, and the Director simultaneously serving as the European Social Delegate, JESC projects and work always apply a European dimension and openness to the 16 different European Jesuit Provinces/Regions. JESC also provides a platform of coordination to the current five social and ecology European networks - Social Delegates, Social Centres, Eco-delegates, JRS and Xavier Network (the last two have a specific coordinator) - while engaging with other intercontinental and/or international Brussels-based networks (such as the Global Ignatian Advocacy Network and the European Laudato Si' Alliance).



Ecology

Accompany the European ecological transition towards sustainability, relying on ecological apostolates of Jesuits and partners.



Leadership

Reinforce Jesuit and Christian networks through leadership formation.



Europe

Give a voice to the excluded in the European political process and accompany groups committed to rethinking Europe.



Justice

Bring closer, through "deeper renewal," the Jesuit social apostolates in Europe by means of service, advocacy, formation and research.


Under the scope of a new strategic plan and with the incorporation of new elements to the team, JESC Ecology strengthened two distinct lines of work; the carbon footprint measurement and the advocacy & networks. In this, significant advancements were achieved in terms of milestones, partnership-building, and impact performance.

JESC CARBON INITIATIVE

During 2022, the newly branded JESC Carbon Initiative (JCI) pursued its goal of accompanying Jesuit and like-minded institutions towards climate neutrality. In the context of this project and in partnership with the French-speaking Western European Province (EOF), JESC conducted a pioneer province-wide assessment of the carbon footprint of Jesuit communities in France, Belgium and Luxembourg. The results of this wide-scoped audit, which involved surveying 74% of the province's Jesuits (317 Jesuits, 25 communities) will now underpin a provincial dialogue on integral ecology and serve to draft a data-driven provincial strategy of decarbonisation.

Within the same project, JESC produced the 2022 Loyola Congress Carbon Footprint event report, a symbolic development which underscored the evolving nature of the mission and the current centrality of the 4th UAP. JCI performed a similar carbon audit for the European Laudato Si' Alliance's (ELSiA) annual integral ecology retreat in November in Taizé. Aside from events, the project embarked on a new line of assessing the carbon profile of offices, with a pilot experience in the EOF Jesuit Curia in Paris. A fourth line connected with schools is expected to see the light in the second half of 2023.

Along this journey the JCI deepened working relationships with European Jesuit and other Catholic networks and institutions, engaged and developed ties with valuable scientific partners such as the World Resources Institute (WRI), and laid the foundations for expanded operations, engagement and impact in 2023 and the years to come.






ADVOCACY & NETWORKS

2022 proved to be challenging for the JESC Advocacy & Networks staff. Nevertheless the guiding work plan produced earlier in the year enabled the achievement of relevant activities and influential impacts. In that, five webinars on different topics (EU taxonomy, COP 27, private sector and green transition, intergenerational ecological dialogue, and the EU Fit for 55 package) were organised by JESC or in partnership with others, with the first two being part of a wider advocacy and awareness raising campaign. The European Laudato Si' Alliance (ELSi'A), a network of Catholic organisations promoting ecological justice, greatly facilitated such with its role of bringing together relevant Brussels-based faith-inspired actors, thereby becoming an important platform for collaboration and exchange in the EU-oriented ecology work. A three days-long eco-retreat held in November in Taizé was another of the important ELSi'A's activities during the year.

In regards to the European context, the Loyola Congress revealed the importance of the Jesuit Provinces appointing Eco-delegates with clear mandates and responsibilities related to the ecological transition of the Provinces. This new network of European Eco-delegates began regularly meeting from the Fall period onwards with the purpose of exchanging ideas and good practices. There were also regular contacts and meetings with other relevant networks, such as the transcontinental Global Ignatian Advocacy Network (GIAN) and the High Education for Social Transformation (HEST) cluster, which provided a stability that is paramount when it comes to advocacy effectiveness and impact building.

A new project about the feasibility study on a possible EU-related Future Generations Representative was also prepared in 2022, and is expected to be implemented in 2023. The legal pathway has proved to be an effective means to force governments and private enterprises to comply with the approved ecological regulations, hence the importance of such a project.







The year 2022 brought numerous advancements in the life of the European Leadership Programme (ELP).

At the beginning of the year, one of the longstanding dreams of ELP was finally made real; having all the 20 Fellows living in the same street, thus forging an even stronger ELP community. The new house at Rue André Fauchille 3A, facing the house at 6 on the same street, was a project codeveloped with the local German parish, whose community is very supportive of the project.

During the late Spring months, with the help of different focus groups composed of more than 60 stakeholders, extensive feedback and fresh ideas for the way ahead were gathered, thereby developing what is now known as ELP 2.0. The improvements incorporated from the Fall 2022 cohort were of different scale: from minor details up to the biggest transformations, allowing more space for personal growth, spiritual reflection, and understanding of the call and mission ELP aims to fulfil, "to form young Ignatian leaders to serve the European common good."

The accuracy of this basic intuition at the core of the programme was happily confirmed right before the end of the year, with the moving Christmas dinner and sharing held by Fellows and ELP team. In a city where thousands of young professionals work in EU institutions and international organisations for so many different reasons, ELP is touching the hearts and minds of young people who discover/confirm the joy of being guided by a vision and values of service to others.





After several years of having a German Jesuit as Secretary for European Affairs, a new Jesuit arrived from Italy in 2021. Unfortunately he could not stay for long, and there has been a void in the position for the last months of 2022 (which still persists in the beginning of 2023). In spite of the short stay, this Secretary worked hard during the time spent in Brussels, with several articles published on different European themes, and through engagements with different groups dedicated to the study and promotion of the European project and values.

The main group working with the JESC Secretary of European Affairs is "Passion for Europe," a group founded in 2017 which unites committed Christians of different European nationalities. This group annually organises a weekend session in La Pairelle during September (near Namur), and the 2022 edition "European democracy in a time of confusion" was attended by more than 60 participants from all over Europe, with a preparative online webinar having taken place in June. Another important group is the "Initiative of Christians for Europe" (IXE), which unifies 15 European Christian associations and meets twice a year to discuss and publish on a relevant European theme. "Securing peace, stability and prosperity in Northern Ireland after Brexit" was the chosen topic for 2022. The Secretary also accompanied the monthly meetings of the "European Sunday Alliance," a Brussels-based alliance of institutions that seeks to promote the legal defence and respect for a common day of rest in the whole EU.

Finally, the Secretary organised, in partnership with Aggiornamenti Sociali (Milan) and the Jesuit Center for Faith and Justice (Dublin), the week-long workshop "Faith & Politics" during August in Venice. This workshop, which started in 2006 and has since been occuring every two years, aims to help young Christians interested in politics to reflect upon their vocation with the help of high-level officials, politicians and civil servants.














After successive postponements due to the pandemic, the long-awaited Justice and Ecology Congress finally took place in 2022, bringing together directors and team members of the different social networks of Europe. The meeting took place between 28 March and 1 April in Loyola, the birthplace of Saint Ignatius (founder of the Jesuits), and gathered 160 participants from 26 different countries. With a first day dedicated to the spiritual roots of Jesuit commitment, the following days tackled the complex issues of migration and ecology, with the final days being dedicated to the sharing and discerning of possible joint answers. The Congress was jointly designed by the networks, with the JESC team taking responsibility for the whole practicalities of the event.

The Congress gave a strong impulse to the work of the networks that had been less active, and new steering committees were elected after the summer. It was also in September that Peter Rožič SJ was replaced by Filipe Martins SJ both as JESC Director and as European Social Delegate. Fr. Filipe already worked in JESC as Justice Assistant and Congress Officer, thus facilitating a smooth transition of roles.

"For many of us, this is the first time we've attended an event of this nature. We all have important work that demands much of us, so it is natural that our attention is captured by what is in front of us. The connection that we might have to people doing similar work in another nation may not be immediately obvious, nevermind the link that might exist between us and those who are pursuing what seems like entirely different work. Yet as we all make our way to Loyola, the fact is that we travel in the same direction. The Congress will be a success largely to the extent that we can share openly about the place we occupy, about the challenges we face, and the possibilities that might emerge when we find partners in mission we did not know about"



Expenditure 2022


